A YEAR IN REVIEW

More children, and more impact. This sums up our bustling year, as we served 628 children, nearly doubling our service from last year. With the increase in demand from local families, we have found ingenious ways to provide more support.

We increased the number of children participating in sitebased and in-school group programs, providing more than 10,400 mentoring opportunities. We engaged 140 volunteers, connecting children and youth in need with a consistent and positive role model. Based on the 5 outcomes of successful positive relationships, 85% of children in our programs reported feeling cared for, challenged, supported, encouraged, and empowered.

We innovated mentor recruitment with the creation of a new Collaborative, Mentoring South East. We brought back the community-loved Teddy Bear Picnic, sponsored by Tamarack Homes. Over 1,000 community members gathered at Lake Ontario Park for a celebration of healthy development opportunities for young kids, raising critical funds for our mentoring programs.

We are thankful for the incredible support that allowed us to increase services, delivering more than 11,000 mentoring hours for local children and youth: from our funders to dedicated Board members, staff, and volunteers. As we see local families continue to face increased challenges, we remain committed to expanding needed support programs and strengthening the positive development of our community.

The OTF Resilient Communities Fund grant supported a project aimed to rebuild the organization's financial and service capacity through creation of the innovative Collaborative. Mentoring South East.

Mentoring South East is a Collaborative among three local charities: Big Brothers Big Sisters of KFL&A, Youth Diversion, and BGC South East.

The Collaborative created an online platform where community members interested in volunteering as a mentor can browse different programs that address a range of child and youth needs. Volunteers select their areas of interest, location, time availability, and length of commitment. Searches generate programs that match their specific selections.

"This year, we are seeing the highest need in the last 7 years. With this record rise, we sought to create more efficient processes for recruitment and intake of interested volunteers. Thanks to the OTF grant, this new recruitment tool will help us find mentors in new service areas, such as South Frontenac and Napanee" - Kylie Filion, Supervisor, BBBS
